The value of the attribute is defined to be one of a list of possible values but in the document it contained something that is not allowed for that type of attribute. The attribute given above is required for an element that you've used, but you have omitted it. For instance, in most HTML and XHTML document types the "type" attribute is required on the "script" element and the "alt" attribute is required for the "img" element.

Typical values for `type` are `type="text/css"` for `<style>` and `type="text/javascript"` for `<script>`.

4. **Warning** *Line 169 column 47: reference to non-SGML character.*

You've included a character reference to a character that is not defined in the document type you've chosen. This is most commonly caused by numerical references to characters from vendor proprietary character repertoires. Often the culprit will be fancy or typographical quote marks from either the Windows or Macintosh character repertoires.
